### **SCOTTISH PARLIAMENTARY QUESTION: S5W-05834**

#### **USE OF INTERPRETERS**

The Cabinet Secretary in his response to the above PQ indicated that it related to operational matters within the responsibility of the Scottish Courts and Tribunals Service (SCTS) corporate body. I am now writing in response to the matters raised.

### S5W-05834 asked:

how many interpreters the Scottish Courts and Tribunals Service employed in each year since 2007-08, broken down by the language interpreted.

The SCTS does not directly employ interpreters. Instead, it is a partner to the Scottish Government's Framework Contract for Interpreting, Translation and Transcription Services. The SCTS requests the services of interpreters, when required, through this contract. The right to interpretation and translation for those who do not speak or understand the language of the proceedings is enshrined in Article 6 of the European Convention on Human Rights to ensure the right to a fair trial.

The SCTS does not routinely collate statistics on the deployment of interpreters broken down by language interpreted. However, we are able to provide you with data from the current interpretation service providers on instances where an interpreter was arranged to be present for proceedings under the contract. Annexes A to C to this letter provide this information, with the figures broken down by language. This information is only available for the calendar years 2014, 2015 and 2016.

Please note that each figure represents an individual occasion on which an interpreter was required to attend court. A single court case requiring an interpreter to be present over several days will therefore feature more than once in the figures as will cases where the relevant hearing did not in fact proceed on that day.

I hope that this information is helpful. A copy of this letter will be placed in the Scottish Parliament Information Centre and published on the Scottish Courts and Tribunals Service website.
